Home builders find election night success in the midterms

ndiana Builders Association members on the ballot on November 6 held serve for the most part across the state of Indiana as they ran for election or re-election to the Indiana Senate and Indiana House of Representatives.

First time candidate, Linda Rogers (R-Granger) was successful in her bid to become a State Senator as she defeated



her Democrat challenger in an open-seat by a 61%-39% margin. Rogers knocked off long-time State Senator Joe Zakas in the Republican primary setting up an open seat race for Senate District 11. Rogers, a home builder, served the IBA as State President in 2015.

Staying on the Senate side, IBA Board Member, Chris Garten (R-Scottsburg) won election to the Indiana Senate in his first race for public office by a 63%-34% margin over his Democrat opponent in Senate District 45. Senate District 45 covers several counties in southern Indiana, where Chris operates a granite countertop company.



State Representative Dale DeVon (R), Granger, held off a spirited challenge from his Democrat opponent by a 51%-49% margin. This was one of the most competitive and expensive races in the state this election cycle and DeVon was able to hold off his opponent by executing a strong campaign. DeVon, a home builder and Life Director of the IBA, has served in the Indiana General Assembly

"For the most part, IBA enjoyed strong success this election cycle," commented Rick Wajda, IBA's CEO. "Of our members running for the Indiana General Assembly, all but one was elected or reelected to serve the citizens of the State of



Indiana." We also had several members running for local positions and they found success locally as well."

Pat Richard made a point to contact every local association to ask for their participation.



Local associations from across the state sent representatives to the recruitment training where they were taught how to secure leads and incentives for the drive. Residential code review nears completion; rule promulgation begins

The state's 11-member review committee was established by the Indiana Fire Prevention and Building Safety Commission in May and has met monthly to complete its review of the 2018 International Residential Code by December 31, 2018. The review

committee will meet on November 20 to review proposed code changes for chapters 39-appendices and on December 19. The proposed rule will begin the year-long rule adoption process in 2019 and be in effect on January 1, 2020 as is statutorily required by SEA 393.

Highlights from action taken on the proposed code changes submitted for chapters 1-38 include:

- •Deleted the requirement to install a fire sprinkler system (statutorily prohibited by SEA 393, therefore, the code cannot require it), but left language referencing the installation standard should someone choose to install a fire sprinkler system
- •Deleted requirement to protect floor/ ceiling assemblies with ½" gypsum

board

- •Maintained requirement for an egress window in every basement
- •Amended stair geometry to 7 ¾" for riser height and 10" for tread depth 3 years after the code goes into effect (Indiana's current stair geometry is 8 ¼" for riser height and 9" for tread depth)
- •Amended seismic design category to "C" for those areas of the state that would be "D" and result in more stringent, costly construction requirements
- •Expanded requirement for all roof installations to include ice and water shield (Indiana's current code limits installation of the product to certain counties)
- •Eliminated requirement for doors that separate garages from living areas to be self-closing
- •Defeated a proposal to streighten the concrete mixture used in all basement walls, foundations, porches, steps, driveways, sidewalks, garage floors
- •Defeated a proposal to require all concrete to be sealed
- •Maintained cost-effective improvements to energy efficiency requirements that have a reasonable payback for homeowners
- •Maintained requirement to install carbon monoxide alarms, though IBA has asked for the Attorney General's office to weigh in on a proposal to shield installers from liability
- •Amended requirement to allow attic access from the garage

A few items of importance that require committee action include:

- •Requirement for protection from accidental impact for appliances located in the garage
- •Requirement to install arc -fault circuit interrupters
- •Requirement to install tamper-resistant

receptacles

•Requirement for ducted returns
While not impossible to make changes to
the code after the committee completes its
review, it will be more difficult. If there



Close communication was kept between the state and local chapters to ensure that planning for the drive was running smoothly. Calls between staff and drive coordinators were held every week before the event.



Applications for model and spec home deductions due Dec. 31

The Model Residence Deduction and the Residence in Inventory Deduction provide a 50% deduction on the structure (not the land) for up to three models and three residences in inventory, statewide for the initial partial assessment followed by three full assessments. Applications for the deductions for 2018 must be completed and signed by the property owner no later than Dec. 31, 2018 and filed with the county auditor no later than Jan. 5, 2019.

Applications for both deductions are available at https://www.in.gov/dlgf/8516.htm. Select State Form 53812 for the model residence deduction and State Form 54861 for the residence in inventory deduction.

Architectural copyright troll Design Basics stopped again

his fall, a federal trial court in Indianapolis decided that Design Basics, a producer of market-ready designs for single-family homes, had not presented enough evidence to even ask a jury to decide whether Jasper homebuilder Kerstiens Homes & Designs had infringed the copyright in some Design Basics plans. The court explained that, while copyright does apply to designs of single-family homes, no one can use copyright to stop others from using common design elements such as the relative positioning of rooms, putting a closet in every bedroom, and placing kitchen counters against the kitchen walls. Since the similarities Design Basics had identified between its plans and Kerstiens' designs were that kind of common element, and there were many, many differences, the court threw out the lawsuit. Design Basics is appealing that decision.

Just over a year ago, the federal Court of Appeals over Indiana held in another lawsuit that Design Basics had not proven that the builder it had sued had actually copied protectable aspects of its designs. More of the company's over 120 lawsuits against builders are now reaching deci-

sions by trial courts, and the courts are carefully accepting the appellate court's guidance to carefully compare the protectable aspects of the copyright owner's designs with the alleged copies, ignoring features found in common use. This is bringing the legal system to a reasonable conclusion about the scope and usefulness of copyright in architectural plans. The copyright system is designed to

protect creators from others copying their work. Since there is rarely direct evidence of copying, someone can be found to be an infringer if (1) they had access to the copyrighted work, and (2) there ends up being "substantial similarity" between the two works. These cases clarify that the "substantial similarity" test should ignore the aspects of designs that are common or driven by market demand, adding that differences between the designs weigh against the conclusion that copying took place.

There are several companies that try to profit primarily from infringement law-suits rather than business relationships, just hoping to get settlement payments or royalties priced just low enough to make an extortionate settlement more economical than being tied up in litigation of questionable copyright infringement

claims. While these cases make it much more likely that a builder would win a lawsuit in the end, what can they do to minimize that risk or avoid the problem in the first place?

One thing a company can do to protect itself from copyright trolls is to avoid access by its employees to websites of known copyright trolls like Design Basics. The importance of this limitation should be communicated personally and clearly, and that communication might be backed up by filters on web access at the browser or network level. Since the copyright owners have to prove access to succeed in their infringement claims, avoiding access might defeat those claims.

Another thing a company can do is register its copyright in its own designs. While it doesn't take much originality at all to be able to protect a design under copyright law, having your own registration certificate from the United States Copyright Office provides a bit of objective evidence that can show a court or jury that you understand how copyright works and your design is original itself.

But that copyright registration has some positive value, too. While it wouldn't give you the right to stop others from using your window, door, or pillar designs, a copyright registration protects against people actually copying the plans and avoiding all of the work that went into creating them. One disgruntled employee can make things complicated for a business, but copyright can give the company some big sticks for enforcement.

So update your company policies and Internet filters to reduce your risk. Contact a copyright attorney who knows about architectural works to discuss registration of your original designs. And if a troll offers you a ticket on the royalty train, you'll be ready.
